“Geo. Gabisch Co. Takes Over Power-Townsend Interests”

The name of the firm of the Power-Townsend Company has been changed to the Geo. Gabisch Co., according to George Gabisch who has taken over the Broadwater County interests of the Power-Townsend Company. R.M. O’Hearn will be associated with the new firm as auditor and machinery salesman.

The newly organized firm will conduct its business in the same plant as formerly occupied by the Power-Townsend Company and on much the same lines, said Mr. Gabisch. There are eight employees of the firm, Mr. Gabisch manager; R.M. O’Hearn, Miss Pauline Riley in the office; Clerks, Owen Hoffman, Elmer Feldt, Lawrence Gabisch. In the Chevrolet Department, Chas. Tomcheck is manager with C.W. Cady, shop foreman of the garage and repair shop, and John Deadmond, mechanic.

During the time this enterprising business has been organized in Townsend, it has undergone three major changes. In 1911 organized with T.R. Macauley as manager, the firms’ name was The Townsend Hardware and Implement Company. L.A. Struder succeeded Mr. Macauley and was head of the company until his death in 1918. During the years that Mr. struder headed the concern, they took over the Missouri Valley Hardware Company and later the Broadwater County Hardware Company, both independent stores operated by local men.

In 1929, the Townsend Hardware and Implement Company merged with the T.C. Power Company of Helena taking over the implement and grain elevator interests and has had the title of Power-Townsend Company since that date. Mr. Gabisch has been manager for the past 18 years.
