This year he chose to tell them the difference in celebrations of the day in different countries, in France, England and America and had with him articles of interest to bring out points in his comparisons. Mr. Hooks is well versed and appealed to his young listeners with bits of humor to hold their interest and attention. He particularly drew attention to the Burial of the Unknown Soldier in these countries.

His address was appropriate and severed as an educational program on the 18th Armistice Day.
